FOCUS:

The readings for this month focus so strongly on the direct link between our faith, our knowledge of our own weakness, and the call to act with justice. It is easy at times to believe that the call to aid is answered by \$10.



A gentle reflection on the readings tells us that it is in the way we respond in the workplace and in the home, the way in which our eyes are open to the "Lazarus in our midst", that our true faith is revealed.

The call is to be a caring people. But to be a caring person we have to put our self in the company of those who are in need. We cannot meet the afflicted; we cannot visit the sick, when we remain sitting in front of Sky!!

Are we like the rich man as we comfortably sit at the table with our rich and comfortable food, the SKY decoder, the 60 inch screen, and the Ford Ranger (so that we can avoid helping our neighbour on the weekend!!)? Do these "things" stop us getting up and looking for the one in need? The call of the gospel says we, like the father in the story of the prodigal son, have to take the first step. We must get up and go out to: welcome, see from afar, run toward the other, embrace, feed, clothe, and be an advocate and all done in the face of those who don't think this type of love is just! (the older brother of the parable).
